You can find a lot in Ancestry.com. I am on the family plan for ancestry, which includes world ancestry and newspapers. I have found many obituaries in the newspapers that I would normally not find.

I have also been making tied quilts for our church quilting group. We give them away to the Red Wing Women's shelter and Ruth's House in Faribault (a womens' shelter also). We also give some to the Marie Sandvik mission in Minneapolis.

Red Wing, MN 2026 Stevne Location

Welcome to Red Wing, MN, the stevne location for 2026. Red Wing, located on the Mississippi river, was settled in the early 1850s, becoming a city in 1857. It was built on the site of a Mdewakaton Dakota village. It was an important location because of

the access to the river, and later the railroad.

Red Wing has a rich history of Norwegian and other Scandinavian immigrants who settled there. The city was also settled by Germans, Scots, and Yankees. One Norwegian connection was with the Lutheran Ladies Seminary. We will learn more about this at the stevne.



Todd Walsh

The Red Wing Lutheran Ladies' Seminary



Todd Walsh is author of “Castle on the Hill—the Lutheran Ladies’ Seminary of Red Wing, Minnesota.” He grew up in Red Wing and is a graduate of Macalester College and Luther Northwestern Theological Seminary in St. Paul, Minnesota. He served as a pastor in several Lutheran churches in Minnesota, and also as a chaplain at a senior living community. While serving congregations, he also became an Emergency Medical Technician and volunteer firefighter. He also gave 24 years to Southeastern Minnesota Emergency Medical Services as a facilitator for critical incident stress debriefings. Four trips to Latvia, Russia, and the Holy Land and trips each to Germany and Tanzania supported congregation global mission. He also served as a board member and president of an American foundation that raised money for a Lutheran seminary in Russia.

Todd’s parents bought the former President’s House of the Lutheran Ladies’ Seminary the year he graduated from high school. So began his interest in the lost Lutheran academy. The Lutheran Ladies’ Seminary story became a sometime hobby and at other times an obsession. College produced a research project and honors project. He has been privileged through the years to meet former students and family members and a host of librarians and archivists in Minnesota and Iowa.

Goodhue County Historical Society with the financial support of Red Wing Shoe Company Foundation and Suzanne Blue published “Castle on the Hill” in 2023 and it is on sale at the museum and

through its web site. Todd and co-author Frederick Johnson received a 2024 Award of Commendation from the Concordia Historical Institute in St. Louis, Missouri. The institute is the official department of archives and history for the Lutheran Church—Missouri Synod.

Todd is now retired in Red Wing and still enjoys looking into the LLS story and the other schools that were part of Red Wing’s history. The two schools share an interesting and complicated...typically Lutheran...relationship. Red Wing Seminary was Hauge Synod, a Norwegian church body. The school was also headquarters for Hauge Synod. Aspelund in central Goodhue County is the mother church of the Hauge followers in Goodhue County and Minnesota.

Lutheran Ladies’ Seminary was Norwegian Synod...basically the state church of Norway transplanted in America. The Hauge followers were considered heretics by Norwegian Synod. Their namesake Hans Nielsen Hauge was imprisoned in Norway several times. You can see the relationship between the two schools in the geography of College Hill. Red Wing Seminary opened in 1879 on the eastern end of College Hill. Lutheran Ladies’ Seminary opened in 1894 on the far western end of College Hill...as far away from Red Wing Seminary, while still being on the hill. It did not take long before students and staff related. Norwegian Synod and Hauge Synod merged into the Norwegian Lutheran Church of America in 1917, along with the United Lutheran Church of America (the body that formed in 1890 as a result of the Predestination Controversy). If this sounds like a soap opera, it is.

Many people in Red Wing mix up the schools, which is understandable. There was a big online fight on one of the Red Wing history Facebook pages when my book came out a couple years ago. Someone said they had lived in Red Wing all their life and knew for a fact there was never a school at the Lutheran Ladies’ Seminary site. One of the people on the publishing team corrected the errant information. Google Artificial Intelligence also is not very intelligent. It has the whole story mixed up. There is no point in trying to fix that one.

Although David Christ was born in Chicago at the beginning of WW II, a few months later found him

growing up in Winnebago County, Iowa, that most Norwegian of locales. It has been said that it has the highest percentage of residents with Norwegian ancestry of any county in Iowa. He believes this to be true as when he was young he knew no fellow students who were not of Norwegian descent. David himself through both of his mother's parents is a member of the fifth generation of Norwegian immigrants.



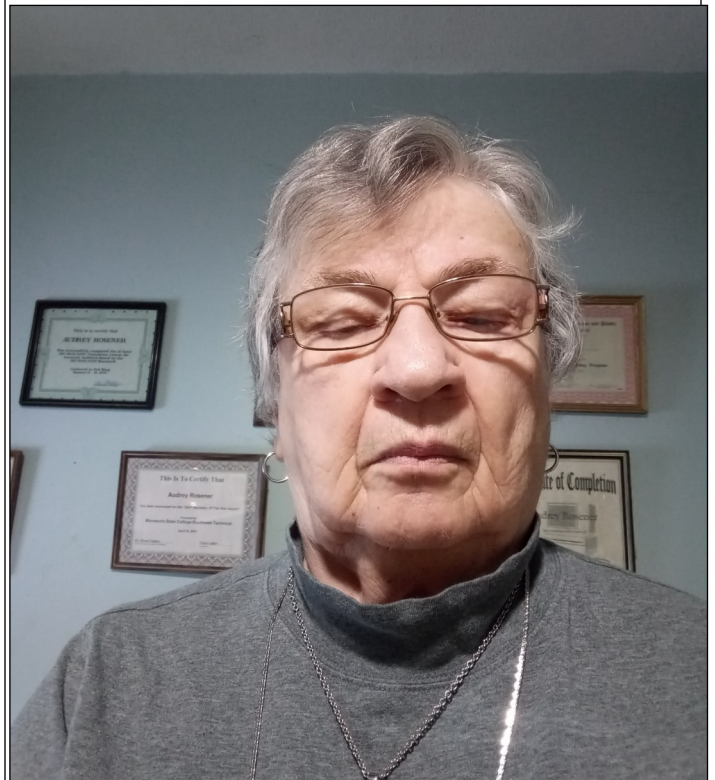
Leaving this cradle of ethnic uniformity for higher education, David landed in Iowa City on the southern fringe of "Norwegianness" in Iowa. He trained in Statistics and Library Science. He also was active in Amateur Radio and Bicycling, at one time being a partner in a bike shop. Although living in a community founded by Germans and Czechs, he found opportunities to maintain connections to his heritage through Sons of Norway and the Bygdelag movement, holding leadership positions in both organizations. David has been fortunate to have visited Norway several times.

David knows people who celebrate their connections to Norway by looking back having grandparents and cousins who are still there. He looks the other way with a child, grandchildren and now a new great grandchild in Norway, all with Norwegian citizenship. He inherited Norwegian genes from his Norwegian immigrant ancestors. David is now completing the circle by sending them back through his descendants in Norway.

Audrey Rosener

Vasa Children's Home

Audrey Rosener is a lifelong resident of the Vasa/Welch area. She graduated from Cannon Falls high school in 1965. Throughout her married life she worked outside of the home. Audrey has been a lifelong member of the Vasa Lutheran Church and has served on the Vasa Museum board for 23 years. For the last 17 years she has been the chairman of the board. Vasa has a history going back to 1853. Many things have had their beginnings here and Audrey is always happy to share Vasa history.

Muus vs Muus

Kari Lie Dorer is a Professor of Norwegian, the Norwegian Department Chair, and the King Olav V Chair in Scandinavian-American Studies at St. Olaf College, Northfield, MN.

Kari Lie Dorer's deep interest in Norwegian language and culture began in childhood. It brought her to Sagavoll Folkehøyskole and the University of Oslo, and culminated with a Ph.D. in Germanic Studies from the University of Texas.

She is the co-author of *Sett i gang: An Introductory Norwegian Curriculum*, a widely used Norwegian language curriculum, and *Muus vs. Muus: The Scandal that Shook Norwegian-*



America, a book that provides a unique look into the early Norwegian immigrant community that founded St. Olaf College.

She teaches a wide variety of courses in Norwegian language, history, and film. Dorer has been actively involved in *Crossings 200*, as the chair of the *Crossings and Connections: Norwegian Migration to North America* conference held in June of 2025 at St. Olaf College.

Wednesday Tour

Goodhue County History Center - The Goodhue County History Center is home to the Goodhue County Historical Society (GCHS). GCHS serves as the steward for county history by collecting, preserving, and promoting the natural and cultural history of Goodhue County through education and outreach.

Minnesota's oldest county's historical society, the Goodhue County Historical Society, was chartered in 1869. After residing for 37 years in the basement of the County Courthouse, the Society moved into the Baptist Old People's Home building on College Hill in Red Wing in September of 1969. Between 1989 and 1992, the building was remodeled to increase storage and exhibit space.

Memorial Park Memorial Park's view of the community, Mississippi River, and bluffs of both Minnesota and Wisconsin should not be missed. Around 1910, Red Wing civic leaders of the Women's Community Association and Soldiers Memorial Association combined forces and started work on Memorial Park, a scenic Sorin's Bluff retreat dedicated to soldiers of all wars.

The base of the flagpole acknowledges all branches of service.

In 2011, the Red Wing Area Fund (RWF) put together a plan to restore Memorial Park on Sorin's Bluff after years of deterioration. For the restoration of the Memorial Park quarries, RWF partnered with the City of Red Wing. In addition to other improvements, such as new fire rings, picnic tables, and grills, 22 informational kiosk panels were installed throughout the park. Each informational kiosk panel provides an insight into the history and features of Memorial Park or the Red Wing community.

Ski Museum

Ski jumping was first introduced to America from Norway in 1883 by Torjus and Mikkel Hemmestvedt. During the early 1900's there was a group of Norwegian ski jumpers from Red Wing. They were all among the first of their generation to be born in America. The best ski jumpers from the Aurora Ski Club came to be known as the "All Americans" from Red Wing.

The Ski Museum's mission is to preserve the history and heritage of the sport of ski jumping in North America, from 1887 to the present. The American Ski Jumping museum is located on the mezzanine level of the St James Hotel. A volunteer is coming to tell us about the museum and ski club.

Pottery Museum - guided tour - More than 6,000 vintage pieces of artisan-crafted stoneware, art pottery, dinnerware and folk art bring the story of historic Red Wing to life in dozens of exhibits covering 13,000 square feet.

Melissa Schulz

With keyboard, vocals, and drum tracks, Melissa covers a large library of pop, rock, and country hits that can span almost an entire century of music, and also has small collections of other specialty music such as American Folk, Patriotic, and Christmas/Holiday music, among other

genres. Melissa's performances are elevated by her charisma: with an astute ability to read an audience, she's just as good at working a crowd as she is entertaining it.

Gladys E. Svobodny (1928-2025), age 97, of Willmar, MN, passed away Thursday, October 30, at Bethesda Grand in Willmar.

A funeral mass was held November 7 at the Church of St. Mary in Willmar. Interment was in the church cemetery.

Gladys was born on July 29, 1928, to Carl and Anna (Flatebo) Alvig in Dovre Township, Kandiyohi County, Minnesota. She was baptized at Eagle Lake Lutheran Church in rural Willmar and confirmed at Calvary Lutheran Church in Willmar.

Gladys attended rural grade school at District #62, Dovre Township through the eighth grade, then attended Willmar High School, graduating in 1946. After high school, Gladys did secretarial work for an accounting firm and worked for a time at Northwestern Bell.

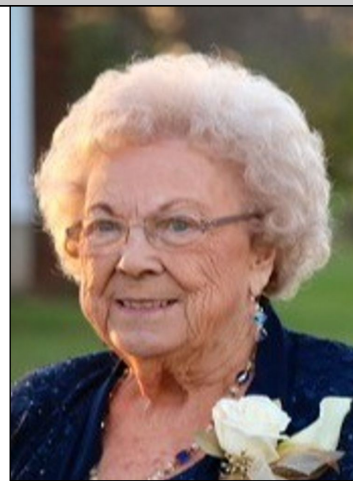
It was during this time that Gladys met the love of her life, Clyde Svobodny. They courted after meeting at the local roller rink and were joyfully united in marriage on June 12, 1948, at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Willmar. They were married for 76 years, until Clyde's passing in 2024.

Gladys and Clyde resided in Danube until 1950, when they moved to Willmar. Gladys continued to work after she was married, then also finding opportunities to contribute to her community. As a member of St. Mary's, Gladys helped serve funeral lunches, attended Bible study groups, and served as wedding coordinator and eucharistic minister to the homebound. Gladys' Norwegian heritage was very important to her, leading to her active membership in the Norwegian organizations Vestlandslag and Hardangerlag. She cherished her trip to Norway to visit her mother's ancestral home.

Their four children and eventually, grandchildren, were the center of Gladys' world. Gladys' fierce love for her family led her to cherish the times

around her table with them. Known for her delicious cooking, she would prepare for days before family gatherings, making sure she had everyone's favorite treats and dishes.

Loved ones will remember and miss Gladys' spunk and quick wit, practicality and kindness, and lived examples of faith. Though she tended to fret about everyone's well-being, her courage, strong values and beliefs saw her through life's ups and downs. She was known to say, "I'm a tough Norwegian!"



She is survived by three children, Michael (Miriam) of Alexandria, James (Kay) of Mankato and Daniel (Lisa) of Brookings, SD.; nine grandchildren and eight great-grandchildren, besides several beloved nieces and nephews.

Gladys was preceded in death by her husband, Clyde Svobodny; her parents; two sisters, Mildred Brandt and Beatrice Frankus; one brother, Gerald Alvig; one daughter, Mary Aistrup; a son-in-law, James Curtis and several in-laws.

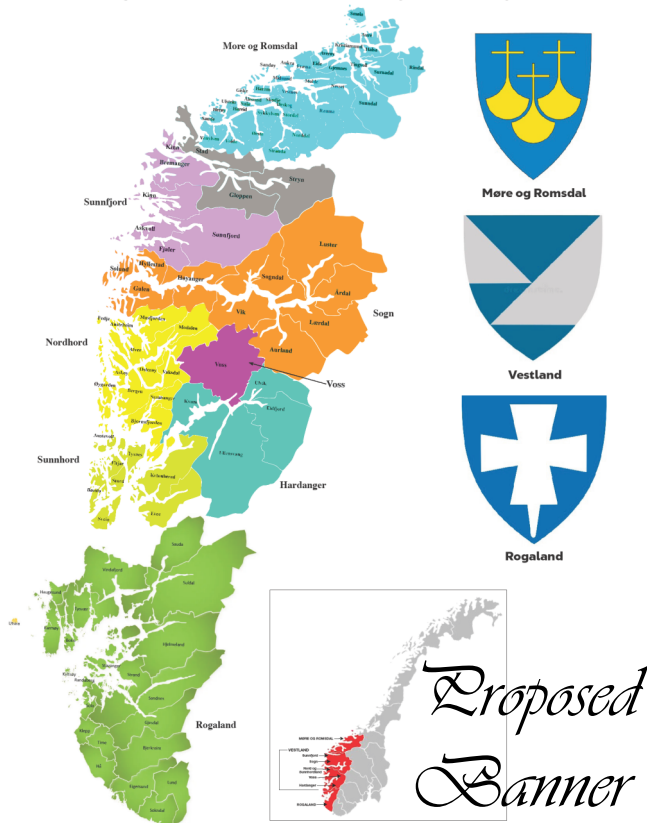

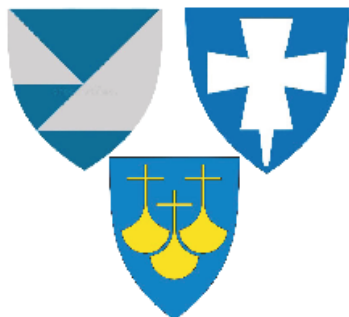

Tamra Foster has been working on a new banner and logo for the Vestlandslag. It has gone through several revisions. What we are showing here is the fall 2025 versions.

The goal is to have all the bygdelags represented, along with the three fylkeskommuner or counties represented by the Vestlandslag.

The motto chosen is “Where the Fjords Flow and Family History Grows.”

The proposed logo makes use of the fylkeskommune or county coat of arms for the Møre og Romsdal, Vestland, and Rogaland.

Language Camp Scholarship

To promote and preserve Norwegian culture in present and future generations, Vestlandslag offers a scholarship to help a student attend a Norwegian language camp.

Two scholarships will be awarded for 2026. The student must be between 10 and 18 years of age and have a parent, grandparent, or great-grandparent who is a member in good standing in Vestlandslag. (Membership valid through 2026)

The scholarship offered will pay up to half the fee of the camp, but not to exceed \$200.

The student should describe their personal interest in Norwegian culture, tell what they hope to learn at camp and describe any previous Norwegian language camp experience via a short essay.

The choice of camp may be resident or day camp as long as Norwegian language and culture are the main focus. Established camps: Masse Moro, Fall Creek, WI (<https://www.massemoro.org>), Skogfjorden near Bemidji, MN (<http://www.concordialanguagevillages.org>), and Norwegian Ridge Language and Culture Camp in Spring Grove, MN (<http://norwegianridge.org>), are examples of such camps.

After attending Norwegian language camp, the student is asked to share their camp experience with Vestlandslag with an essay or an interview for an article with photo in the newsletter. The student is also welcome to give a personal appearance or video at the stevne (if timing is appropriate).
